Mt Hotham and Dinner Plain are about to launch the opening of a new iconic trail that will highlight the importance of Aboriginal heritage of the region.

Linking the two alpine villages of Mt Hotham and Dinner Plain the trail is 12 kilometres in length, with a surface of compacted crushed rock. The project was implemented to provide a greater range of recreational opportunity to a range of participants, i.e., cycling and walking during the summer months and cross-country skiing during the winter.

It was a joint project, co-funded between the Mt Hotham Alpine Resort Management Board and Alpine Shire with assistance from Parks Victoria and the Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation (GLaWAC).

Construction of the trail commenced in 2004 under strict environmental guidelines. In 2005 a cultural heritage assessment identified 25 aboriginal sites in vicinity of the trail. These sites were incorporated into the planning for the trail to ensure that their historical significance was preserved. Trail construction was recommenced in 2011 with the approval of an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Management Plan (ACHMP) for the trail. In accordance with the ACHMP it was recommended that the Hotham — Dinner Plain Trail be given an appropriate Aboriginal name.

Consultation began in 2013 with the Gunaikurnai Land and Water Aboriginal Corporation and other Traditional Owner groups to develop an interpretive signage plan and traditional trail name, promoting significant awareness of the ongoing Aboriginal heritage in the area. The name Brabralung Trail was approved by GLaWAC in December 2014. Brabralung, is the name of the Gunaikurnia Clan for this region of Gippsland, translated as Male, Berry Worcat (female), meaning 'the people'.

This ancient mountain pathway is interpreted along its length, encouraging all to learn of the past, understand the present, and discover the future of the Aboriginal "first peoples" of the Alps.

Due to its accessibility to a range of users, and wide appeal through natural and cultural heritage values, the Brabralung Trail has the potential to become one of the more popular recreational trails in the area.

The Brabralung trail also compliments a growing range of iconic tracks & trails in the Mt Hotham area, including the Razorback and Mt Feathertop Track, The Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing, The Australian Alps Walking Track, The Cobungra Ditch and the Huts Walk.



The Board reviews its Emergency Management Plan annually to ensure it is current and that the risk mitigation strategies we have in place are appropriate. The current review is in preparation of our three yearly audit by Emergency Management Victoria and requires a complete overhaul in accordance with the recent changes made to Emergency Management Legislation. Since the 2013 fires the Board has developed and implemented the Bushfire Emergency Management Plan (BEMP) with the key focus on human life and safety.

Each year we contact stakeholders to minimise bushfire risk around their lodges and buildings as part of our ongoing fire management program.

We would like to thank you all for your ongoing commitment to the safety of our Resort particularly during the fire season each year.

underway around the resort this summer including the rebuild of Koomerang Ski Club, additions to The General Store's Mountain Dreaming apartments and a number of smaller scale works being carried out on a number of lodges.

Koomerang Ski Club rebuild kicked off after several years of planning - the rebuild commenced in November 2014. The first step was to demolish the old Koomerang building to make way for the new, larger, two storey lodge. Equipped with 8 bedrooms all with en-suites, this lodge can now sleep up to 30 people. A large ramp allows access from Davenport Drive into the lodge with communal areas of drying room, lounge and dining areas and a fully functional kitchen.

We all look forward to seeing the final product which is due for completion before the beginning of the 2015 winter season.

The General Store decided to expand their

accommodation after the success of the Mountain Dreaming Apartments, with the addition of 4 more apartments.

The building will have improved access for guests with a network of external walkways, and refurbishment of the existing kitchen. Guests can now access their accommodation without the need to walk through the pub and eating areas.

Kongoola have added a new lobby and manager's room to their lodge. Works began in 2014 and should be completed before winter this year.

Blue Ribbon Lodge have installed new steel emergency stairs.

Lawlers Car Park area has been upgraded to include a new entry point, extension to accommodate an additional ten parking spaces, sealing of the car park surface to incorporate drainage requirements, upgrade of existing sewer pipework, public lighting and pedestrian access.

The Resort Management Board upgraded the sewer before winter 2014 and Lawlers have engaged a company to complete the remainder of the works.

The project is set to be completed before this winter.

In 2010, a 100 year storm event that created a 'valley washout', highlighted the need to replace the Swindler's Valley pipeline. The Mount Hotham Resort Management Board has been managing the construction and replacement of the Swindler's Valley stormwater pipe since that event

The storm created significant damage to the already degraded pipeline and the Village Chairlift loading station.

The \$7.6 million pipeline project was funded by the State Government allocating the money to the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

Mt Hotham Resort Management Board and DELWP formed an agreement which allowed the funds to be used for the

Following the tender application, Benalla excavating and earthmoving contractors, Extons, was awarded the contract to install the major pipes in the valley. Resort Management has had up to 13 employees in

a range of positions including surveying, contract supervisors, transport logistics. pipeline and outlet construction, and installation of snowmaking pipes and services which run under the valley floor, assisting the eight member team from Extons.

The main pipeline has been completed ahead of schedule and a total of 204, 2.1m diameter pipes made of reinforced concrete with a storm flow capacity of 45,000 litres per second have been installed. (This flow would fill the snowmaking dam at Loch Car Park in 5 minutes).

A six-wheel drive ex-army truck with 23 tonne gross vehicle mass was purchased and fitted with a cradle to transport pipe sections to the valley floor.

Mt Hotham Resort Management Board Manager Technical Services, Tom Pelly said "The project team has been highly motivated and there has been a high degree of cooperation between the MHRMB staff and the contractors." Instead of transporting the large amount of crushed rock needed for the project,
